All persons with disabilities direct their own lives in welcoming, inclusive communities.








WORLD STAGE

FINANCIALS

2022/23

Prescott Group's financial statements for the year ending March 31, 2023, have been prepared by Grant Thornton Chartered Professional Accountants.

The March 31, 2023 year end shows a surplus for the year of \$64,687 (\$50,000 of which has been allocated to an Operating Reserve Fund). As a result, the accumulated operating surplus is reported at \$641,653 at year end.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Annual Highlights

As a result of the global COVID-19 pandemic, the effects of public health measures implemented in Nova Scotia had a significant impact on the operations of Prescott Group during this fiscal year. The organization managed to modify their operations to meet public health protocols and still provide a high level of service to its participants.

Main drivers contributing to fiscal 2021's surplus were as follows:

- Reduction to wage expense due to various vacant positions during the year
- Reduction in cost of sales
- Reduction in utilities, maintenance and repairs

Upcoming Year

Prescott Group is budgeting to break even for 2021/22 with diligent expense management being a focus throughout the fiscal year.

The Board and the Audit and Risk Committee monitors Prescott's finances, balancing services to participants and employees with the financial resources available. Thank you to the Board and staff for their continued dedication and assistance.
